The Good, the Bad, the Ugly and the Unexpected

These four talks weigh up the good, the bad, the ugly – and the unexpected about Christianity around the world today, and encourage Christians to have a clear-eyed, humble but confident view of the contributions their faith has made and continues to make to the flourishing of both individuals and societies.

Session 1: How the West Was Won

Christopher Hitchens claims, "Religion poisons everything". What has Christianity really done for the West? Are the Western values that people are still proud of – human rights, democracy, the rule of law, care for the vulnerable and marginalised, the scientific outlook, the value of art and culture – a legacy of Christianity, or a result of moving away from it?

Session 2: Blind Spots

Christians are persecuted in 139 nations around the world; it's estimated that up to four out of five acts of religious discrimination worldwide are directed against them. So why don't we hear more about the global persecution of Christians? Why is the Western media so often silent on what's happening to Christians in communist, post-communist, Muslim, and South Asian countries? Why don't we care more? And what might all this mean for the future of Christianity in the West?

Session 3: Does Religion Poison Everything?

From the Crusades and the inquisitions to witch-hunts, censorship, and the child abuse scandal, sometimes it seems like the Christopher Hitchens' of the world have a point. How bad have Christians been, really? And how should we respond to failures like these? This session aims at an honest assessment of where Christians have departed from the core of their faith.

Session 4: Mythbusting

So the perceptions people (including Christians) often have about our faith, past and present, can be wildly inaccurate. What can we do about that?
